

Student achievement, Sports and Enterprise Event and lots more



As I write it is the end of the first week of the Autumn term here at MECE and although the skies are grey, it has not dampened the spirits of the students who have returned to school this week. It has been a particular pleasure to welcome our new cohort of year 7 students who have impressed us all from the very first day when they achieved 100% attendance which is a brilliant start to their secondary school careers. With the autumnal weather, we also return to our smart winter uniform and in my first assemblies it was clear that in all year groups students had taken care over their appearance and have come back to school with a clear sense of purpose ready to learn wearing their blazers and house ties with pride.

The end of the school year was full of activity and the highlight was our Sports and Enterprise event. Our ambition was to create an event run by the students for the students to allow them to develop their skills of leadership and teamwork,



and to bring the whole school community together. Year 10 students took on the challenge brilliantly and created a range of exciting activities including cake sales, a tug of war, sponge the teacher, hook a duck and a golf challenge amongst many others. In the afternoon the PE department ran a traditional sports day afternoon and there was fierce rivalry as all four houses cheered their support from each side of the track. Bespoke medals created by the Technology team were awarded and overall Chiltern House were victorious. It was an afternoon of sunshine and smiles, truly the MECE community at its best.

The summer break was punctuated by the publication of the GCSE results and we send our congratulations to the year 11 students who sat their exams this year. The results represent five years of hard work by students and their teachers through a period of unprecedented disruption both for the school and nationally, and they can all be proud of what they have achieved. MECE students will continue on to a wide range of Post-16 courses including some who will be taking A levels at sixth form or college, with others moving into apprenticeships and vocational courses. Whatever their ambition, MECE gives our students the tools for the next stage of their education or career.

Star of this year was Amelia Beecroft who achieved nine GCSEs above grade 7 with three grade 9s - she will be moving on to study A levels at Piggott School. Others with top grades include Ben White, Theo Ridgetts and Martina Legouais-Rios who

will going on to study A levels at Henley College. Twins Dan and Josh Kimpton achieved a matching set of results with one grade 8, and four grade 7s each amongst their collection of grades and will be continuing their A level studies at Highdown Sixth form.

We are especially proud of the haul of GCSEs received by two students who joined us from the Ukraine, both achieved an impressive 9 GCSE grades - an incredible achievement.

I am very proud of all our students who have shown resilience and commitment to achieve these results and of the staff who have gone above and beyond to support them. I am excited for their next steps post-16 and the contribution they will make to our community in the future.

Sonning Common Primary School invests in energy efficient classrooms

'As someone who is passionate about climate action and sustainability, I find myself in an influential position as Oxfordshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Children, Education and Young People's Services. 'It's meant I've been able to push a number of exciting initiatives to make schools more energy efficient and children more aware of the environment. Sonning Common Primary School is a success story I'm delighted to share. 'Pupils at Sonning Common Primary School are set to benefit from environmentally friendly classrooms after the school successfully applied for a schools energy efficiency loan from Oxfordshire County Council. 'We've been running the interest free loan scheme since July 2023 to help maintained schools reduce their overall energy usage, which in turn could help cut operational costs. 'The school applied to the council for just under £12,000, out of an £800,000 fund, to finance the classroom installation of photovoltaic (PV) technology, which is designed to convert sunlight into electrical energy. 'We've already carried out 50 energy efficiency audits on our council maintained schools. 'The latest round of the loan scheme was launched earlier this year, with Sonning Common Primary School being the second to make use of the fund, after Nettlebed Community School. 'The school hopes to install the photovoltaic (PV) technology during the summer break in readiness for the new term in September.' •

REQUEST FOR DONATIONS

It started in Lockdown when it was perceived to be a 'bit of a treat' for disadvantaged members of our community. In 2020 there were treat boxes delivered, more in 2021 and 2022, and by last year the number had risen to 90.

There was not really any feedback on what had been provided but there was a sense that a different approach might be more acceptable. After discussions with the food bank organisers and the staff at FISH, giving people choice seemed to be the rationale and with it the idea of vouchers.

MEET JENNY WARD

Always actively helping the community



Jenny has lived in Sonning Common for over twenty years and is a very familiar figure in many local organisations. She was born in 1937 and lived in Thames Ditton, Surrey with her parents and two older brothers. She was a very active child loving all sports and being in the great outdoors and this passion has continued throughout her life. On leaving school she attended the Edinburgh College of Domestic Science and while she was there, she played Lacrosse for Scotland.

Her first teaching post was in Guildford where she met her husband to be, a PE teacher called Peter. Soon after they met, he tragically broke his neck as the result of a rugby accident and spent nine months in Stoke Mandeville Hospital, having become paralysed from the shoulders down. They married and both taught at George Abbot school Guildford and became extremely interested in developing sport for the disabled, organising a Surrey team to compete in the Stoke Mandeville games

which were in their infancy. When Jenny became the Deputy Head of Sheerwater School and Peter worked in a local primary school both continued developing sporting opportunities and recognised the physical and mental health benefits of participation.

After her husband's death in 1979 Jenny took a break from teaching acccepting a post as Regional Officer for the British Sports Association for the Disabled in Greater London. During this time, she was instrumental in the inclusion of wheelchair users in the London Marathon for the first time. -something that has gone from strength to strength. Also, following a newfound enthusiasm she trained as a guide for visually handicapped skiers and represented the Haute Savoy region of France in master skiing races.

Her love of Skiing and mountains led her to take a teaching post in Switzerland for six years after which she returned to the UK and found Sonning Common to be a friendly and welcoming place to settle. During the early days of the Covid Epidemic when all residents were required to stay indoors for lengthy periods, Jenny relieved the boredom by deciding to share her ample supply of books with others who might be interested. She put up notices around the village and soon had many interested phone calls. This led her to organise boxes of books in her garage with a bell for people to press when they wished to enter. People

were required to wear masks and help themselves to books and then call out when leaving the premises. It soon became apparent to Jenny that people wished to pay for the books, so she made a donations box available with all proceeds going towards charity.

When Covid restrictions lifted, many donations of books soon followed so Jenny was then able to offer a choice of over two hundred and the demand for books remained very strong. Jenny still welcomes any paperbacks that are donated at her home, and these are available to all comers at the coffee mornings organised by the SC WI. They cost £1.00 for 3 books and the proceeds go to local charities.

Jenny has always enjoyed being busy and keeping active. Her love of the outdoors has enabled her to enjoy walking the Coast to Coast, the Pembrokeshire Path, the Tour de Mont Blanc and many other long-distance walks. She plays a huge part in our local community and as well as being President of the SCWI for three years she still organises coffee mornings, is a very keen Village Gardener. a member of the Chiltern Edge Horticultural Society and also regularly plays Lawn bowls for Shiplake and Caversham. This very busy and active lady has many interests that motivate her to help others and is a huge believer in the power of sport and activity being central to physical and mental wellbeing.









WAR POETS

There are many great poets from both World Wars including Wilfred Owen who lived locally.

Another from the First World War was Rupert Brooke. He was already an established poet and literary figure. When war broke out, he joined up and in the last months of 1914 he wrote five 'war sonnets' that would make him famous. including 'Peace' and 'The Soldier'. He suffered an insect bite in Greece on the island of Skyros which became infected, and he died of blood poisoning on 23 April 1914. He was buried in an olive grove on the island.

Edmund Blunden was one poet who survived the great War. He was born in London and gained a classics scholarship to Queen's College, Oxford, but instead enlisted in the Royal Sussex Regiment in 1915. He started writing poetry at school and continued to write while he trained with the regiment.

Between 1916 and 1918, Edmund saw some of the worst fighting of the war, on the Somme and at Ypres on the Western Front. He was awarded the Military Cross. His active service ended in the spring of 1918 when he was sent back to Britain to recover from a combination of exhaustion and asthma, having been gassed twice. He was greatly affected by his experiences and loss of friends and many of his war poems were written afterwards, contemplating events in retrospect and a deep understanding of the experiences of



the soldiers and the brutal destruction. He died at the age of 77.

Poets from the Great War are still studied in school during English GCSEs however World War Two poets should not be forgotten.

Captain Keith Douglas is considered one of the greatest of his generation and many view him as the only poet of the Second World War to really grasp and carry on the tradition set by his Great War forebears. Through his poetry Douglas shared a vision of the brutal warfare that characterised the Second World War. Conflict is a harsh business.


Captain Douglas was killed in combat three days after D-Day in June 1944. Leaving his tank to go on reconnaissance while pinned on high ground around Tilly-sur-Selles, Normandy. Douglas was struck and killed by mortar fire. He was buried close to where he had died, but eventually moved to the Tilly-sur-Selles cemetery in Normandy.

Remembrance Sunday, 10 November 2024

Remembrance Sunday this year will again be marked by a short, secular Act of Remembrance in the Village Hall led by retired Lieutenant Commanders Alex and Gillian Manning. All are welcome and the doors will be open from 10.45 for a 10.55 start.

The traditional spoken Homage will precede 2-minutes' silence at 11 o'clock. followed by the Kohima Epitaph and the placing of a poppy wreath at the memorial in the Hall entrance honouring 3 local lads who most recently lost their lives in our country's name: Fred Slough in the Falklands, Cyrus Thatcher and Barry Weston in Afghanistan. Brief addresses by Alex Manning and Councillor Diana Pearman will then complete the event. after which tea, coffee or soft drinks will be available courtesy of the Sonning Common WI.

Please note, however, that the Village Hall's maximum capacity is 100, so anyone wishing to attend is invited not to leave it to the last minute, just in case.





MAKE ART NOT WAR

Oxfordshire military museum celebrates anniversary with art exhibitions and competition -

Journeys Through War' exhibition to open on 19 October 2024



Marking the Woodstock-based museum's 10th anniversary and commemorating 110 years since the start of the First World War in 2024, Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum is currently hosting a Great War art exhibition and has run an art competition for young people over the summer, which will culminate in its own exhibition this autumn.

The museum is looking for entries that tie into the theme of 'Journeys Through War', inspired by the museum's own collections. These could take the form of art portraying a glider pilot's flight to Normandy on D-Day, the journey made by the many evacuees who came to Oxfordshire during the Second World War, or even the journeys made by carrier pigeons used to send secret messages during wartime.

The Journeys Through War exhibition will go on display from Saturday 19 October - Sunday 17 November 2024, with any media accepted, and both physical and digital entries welcome.

Submitted work can take inspiration from museum collections from the First and Second World Wars but could take in more recent events or even earlier conflicts.

Based in Broadway, John Noott has been an art collector and dealer for over 50 years, and during this time has drawn together an incredible collection of WW1 art. This latest exhibition is a follow up to The Art of World War II - an exhibition previously hosted by Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum which proved incredibly popular, showcasing a diverse range of original art from a unique mix of artists both amateur and professional, both up-and-coming and well-established.

The Art of the Great War presents a similarly broad range of original art and prints, all produced during, or depicting scenes from, 'The War to End All Wars'. Capturing both the horrors of the conflict and snatched moments of humour during the darkest of times, together the collection provides a very



human perspective of the events of 1914-1918.

The collection is a personal one for John, as he was inspired by childhood memories of his own father, who served in the Royal Army Medical Corps during the Great War's oftenforgotten Salonika campaign. Asked for a personal highlight from the exhibition, he points out one of the largest paintings on display by artist Henry C. Seppings Wright - an official artist to New Zealand forces. The striking piece depicts two German soldiers helping a wounded British Tommy out of a trench. John explains:

"That, to me, it goes to say, we're all human beings ... why are we doing this?".

TOM FORT PUFFING

Our virtuous new government's plan to outlaw smoking in pub gardens set me thinking about my own happy days long ago, with a fag in hand.

I was a precocious smoker. Aged twelve, I was delving into my mother's handbag when she came to take me out for the day from my boarding school and liberating two or three of the Senior Service that she puffed on all day. Not surprisingly, we were not allowed matches at school, so a cigarette had to be lit on the school boiler and secreted up the sleeve. I would then run as fast as possible out of the building, around the lake and into the wood on the other side when – as often as not – the precious fag would have gone out.

At my next school I graduated to French tobacco – Disques Bleus, Gauloises and Gitanes. We thought ourselves so sophisticated. Did I imagine myself to be Alain Delon making eyes at Brigitte Bardot? Probably.

When I went to work in a newspaper office in Slough in 1972 most of the journalists smoked most of the time. As typewriters were pounded, ash rose from the keys then floated back again. My friend and mentor John Jones would squeeze the lighted end of his Number 6 into the wastepaper basket and put the unsmoked half in his jacket pocket for later use. Every now and then the waste paper would erupt into flames after he had left for some murky assignation.

I was a regular smoker – untipped Gitanes or Gauloises – into my forties, then like almost everyone else pretty much gave up. It was no struggle for me as I am not an addictive personality, and I have never missed them. Except.....

I DO still smoke, when I go fishing. I do three or four roll-ups and take time to sit on the riverbank, and stare

at the water and puff away. I love it, even though I know that I am a bad, bad boy.



DO YOU THINK YOU HAVE FLU?



Flu will often get better on its own, but it can make some people seriously ill. It's important to get the flu vaccine if you're advised to.

Check if you have flu symptoms, they are similar for children

Flu symptoms come on very quickly and can include: a sudden high temperature, an aching body, feeling tired or exhausted. A sore throat and dry cough as well as headache, feeling sick and tummy pain

HOW TO TREAT FLU YOURSELF

If you have flu, there are some things you can do to help get better more quickly.

- rest and sleep
- keep warm
- take paracetamol or ibuprofen to lower your temperature and treat aches and pains
- give paracetamol or ibuprofen to your child if they're distressed or uncomfortable – check the packaging or leaflet to make sure the medicine is suitable for your child, or speak to a pharmacist or GP if you're not sure

 drink plenty of water to avoid dehydration (your pee should be light yellow or clear)

A PHARMACIST CAN HELP WITH FLU

A pharmacist can give treatment advice and recommend flu remedies.

Do not take paracetamol and flu remedies that contain paracetamol at the same time as it's easy to take more than the recommended dose.

You or your child have symptoms of flu and:

- you're worried about your baby's or child's symptoms
- you're 65 or over
- you're pregnant
- you have a long-term medical condition – for example, diabetes or a condition that affects your heart, lungs, kidneys, brain or nerves
- you have a weakened immune system – for example, because of chemotherapy or HIV
- your symptoms do not improve after 7 days

You can call 111 or get help from 111 online.

HOW TO AVOID SPREADING THE FLU

Flu is very infectious and easily spread to other people. You're more likely to give it to others in the first 5 days.

Flu is spread by germs from coughs and sneezes, which can live on hands and surfaces for 24 hours.

To reduce the risk of spreading flu: Wash your hands often with warm water and soap, cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze (if you do not have a tissue, cough or sneeze into the bend of your elbow, not into your hand)

Bin used tissues as quickly as possible.

Try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people if you have a high temperature or you do not feel well enough to do your normal activities.

Flu vaccines are safe and effective.
They're offered on the NHS every
year in autumn or early winter to help
protect people at risk of flu and its
complications.

We have followed this up with a Speedwatch on Blounts Court Road in August, where the statistics are worrying high with almost 50% of those vehicles passing were speeding. However, it was good to see the impact we had with almost all drivers slowing down. Thank you!

It's really important that people observe the speed limits in Sonning Common, to reduce the severity and frequency of accidents. You are seven times more likely to survive if you are knocked over by a car travelling at 20mph than 30mph.

Watch out we could be coming to a road near you! If you are caught the police do record this, and if we catch you multiple times the Police will issue a Penalty notice.
