

## **MECE NEWS**

#### MAIDEN ERLEGH CHILTERN EDGE

#### Well done Year 11 students



Students at Maiden Erlegh Chiltern Edge have returned to school this September with a positive spring in their step and the site has its familiar and warm buzz back following the extended summer break.

Just a week before the end of the break many staff were in school to celebrate the Class of 2025's GCSE results – we were delighted with their results which reflected 5 years of hard work, desire to succeed and ultimately their resilience.

70% of students achieved at least five GCSEs at grades 4–9 - a pleasing uplift from last year's headline figure of 43% - reflecting the commitment of students over their years at the school to succeed. Additionally, this year, 18% of all grades awarded were at Grade 7 or above, with 16% of the cohort bagging one or more of the coveted Grade 9s within their suite of results - a testament to their hard work, determination and the culture of high aspirations that has been built at the school.

We are extremely proud that all of the year group are now embarking on Post 16 study at a range of Sixth Forms, Colleges and into Apprenticeships across Oxfordshire and Berkshire. This summer, the school facilitated 24 different qualifications including, for the first time, Further Maths and Home Languages including Spanish, Turkish and Chinese and just under 5% of all grades were awarded at the coveted

Grade 9.

With these results as motivation, students in current Years 10 and 11 have returned with renewed determination to succeed in their GCSE studies and students in Years 7-9 have settled well back into routines as term gets underway. As ever we welcome our new Year 7s to our MECE Community and look forward to seeing them blossom over the course of the next few weeks.

The Autumn term affords plenty of opportunities for prospective parents to visit the school and see us in action - we have 4 Open Morning events in late September and early October and our official Open Evening on Tuesday 30 September - we warmly invite you to come and have a look round and meet our students and staff.

Ready, Steady, Go!



That's right, we are up and running again Another summer gone in a flash! New faces in new classes, and already a happy glow about the place.

I guess if there is one thing guaranteed to raise a teacher's quizzical eyebrow, and particularly that of a headteacher, it is that old trope about how great it must be to have long holidays.

Of course, we all appreciate a bit of a reset from time to time, and you will know from your own children how tired they seem to get towards the ends of terms. Our staff are no different – we encourage them, as far as possible, to put their absolute all into each teaching term and to wind down and relax a little in the interims.

But we don't really stop. There is lots to do, and we never want to rest on last term's laurels.

This summer has seen us working on (or at least supervising and checking on) two major projects.

Our reception class area has been transformed, with colourful new installations, upgraded fencing and two covered areas for our youngest children to explore. The PTA have been instrumental in funding this and it represents a much-appreciated investment to enhance this end of the school.

On the other side of the site, the pool has been renovated – hooray! Several staff have spent time over the summer supervising the install and it looks fantastic. More of this elsewhere in this issue, but we will be re-opening soon and without you we simply could not have done it. Thank you so much for your support.

There are more modest tasks to deal with as we start a new year as well.

As staff finish in July they are asked to consider our priorities for the coming year, and they come back a few days early to help put these into place. In particular this year I want a real focus on manners - children will be guided and expected to show good manners without fail, and staff will in turn need to model this. I feel strongly that this is a key element to becoming a caring and respectable citizen and we need to start it early. In addition, we are re-invigorating our literacy curriculum this year (including a focus on oracy and public speaking) and embedding a new system for recording and assessing children's progress. We have spent a few (children-less) days training staff on all this, and we feel ready to go.

Speaking of which, as I write, I can hear some excited young voices outside my office. They're back! Time to crack on!

I hope you have enjoyed a peaceful summer. Best wishes for the new term.





#### Pond Update - Active Progress

Many of you have asked about the village pond. Here's what we're doing:

Survey Commissioned: Water Resources Associates started work at the end of August with their report due by late September, giving us the technical insight needed for long-term solutions.

Ongoing Monitoring: We are monitoring water levels, especially during rainfall.

While cleared drains do help during heavy rain, levels continue to drop in dry periods.

**Next Steps:** We're working with South Oxfordshire District Council on regular drainage maintenance to keep water flowing properly to the pond.

Your parish council is actively tackling this issue through professional surveys and ongoing monitoring to develop the right long-term strategy •

## **ELLIE'S CHALLENGE** AND STAMINA



Hi, my name is Ellie and I'm 13 years old. I decided to do a 75-mile kavak from Reading to central London to help raise money for a big trip to Canada that represents Oxfordshire Guides. In total I had to raise £3.500 and I had till summer 2027 to raise it all.

The reason I picked kayaking was because I love sports and being active. At my secondary School I was selected to go to Henley rowing club and practice rowing on Fridays. I also love doing sports clubs at lunch time. You may have seen a write up about my sponsorship in the last edition of the Sonning Common magazine. I'm going to tell you about my exciting adventure on the Thames.

On day 1 we started out from Reading bridge, and it was a lovely sunny day. I felt ready and prepared to know that my feet were not going to touch dry ground for a good few hours. I was feeling excited and nervous all in one.

One hour into the trip a grumpy looking swan swam towards me hissing so I wasted no time in paddling on. We were having lunch, and some ducks were

swimming to my mum eager to have a taste of her food and were pecking at her boat!

The rain came later that day and it chucked it down. We saw a beautiful double rainbow though, so it was worth it. There was also so much wildlife and throughout the day we saw 9 kingfishers and many more herons.

We got to Marlow around 6:30pm and finished having paddled 17 miles. Day



#### DAY 2

We started out from Marlow and were hoping to get to Runnymede. The wind was picking up that day and for a lot of the trip we were paddling against it. It was really hard and at points I felt like it was just pointless to keep on paddling against the wind because we weren't really getting anywhere, but we powered on.

I went to get out of the boat onto a bank for a minute and it was quite a tall bank, so I climbed up, stood up and completely lost my balance. I questioned whether I should try to fall back onto my kayak or if I should just accept that I would get soaked. In the end I leapt to the boat which was now maybe half a metre to a metre away from the bank and landed in a spider man-like pose! It surprisingly worked and so I paddled on dry!!!

There were many locks that we had to get out and carry our boats around- about 7-8 in all - but 2 of the lockkeepers were very kind and let us ride in the lock.

Overall, it took us 11.5 hours because of the wind, and we paddled for 20 miles. Day 2 complete!!

throughout the day. For the last two nights we had been camping out but, for this night, we were able to book a hotel right next to the water. Pure luxury! After a long day of paddling, we got to the hotel, and I had the longest bath I have ever had before and then got into my bed and fell fast asleep early because we were having to wake up at 6:00am the next day. Day 3 done and 18 miles complete.

bus followed by many more

This day was one of my favourites because we were riding with the tide downstream towards Central London. We had only been on the river for halfan-hour when a very apologetic rower hit my boat, but no one fell in, so it was all good!

A swan was chasing me down the Thames at one point too, which was quite scary. There were a lot of big boats that created massive waves which were exciting to go over. We met a man who was trying to save a swan that was being attacked by another swan (not the

> best idea) and had fallen out of his kayak while the boat was floating away.

We paddled all the way to Big Ben. The House of Parliament and the London Eye. The sights were amazing to see from our kayaks and we all really enjoyed it. On the last day we did 20 miles, and we finished metres away from the London Eye itself!

Overall, it was a great

adventure with funny moments and hard moments but I'm very happy that I did it as this is probably a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity. So many people supported me in being able to do this, especially my mum who paddled all four days and helped me to keep going and my dad who worked out all the planning and rules of the river.

A great thanks to everyone who donated



towards this as well. I have raised over £3,500 now which is amazing seeing as I still have 2 years before my Canada trip. All extra money will be sent to support my primary and secondary schools in Sonning Common.

The Escape Room was a huge success at **Sonning Common Library during August** and early September this year.

The library is always a busy place in the summer holidays, and the attraction of a problem-solving adventure murder mystery just added to its many attractions. The Escape room is the brainchild of Kate Eke who is a committee member of the Friends of Sonning Common Library and who has lived in the village for over 6 years The game evolved from a social meeting of the Friends when entertainment was required, and Kate and Juliet Legg provided an "Escape Room" style puzzle for the volunteers to solve. It proved highly successful, became quite competitive, and resulted in Kate devising the present game from this starting point.

Kate has always enjoyed puzzles and formulated a game that can be played by the whole family or a team of up to five people. It is interesting and fun for all age groups but especially to teenagers and can take place by using the clue stations sited around the library. No prior knowledge is necessary. The instructions are very detailed and clear, but it requires collaboration to solve the various challenges which might include code breaking or finding out information. The props and information sheets at each station ensure the game can take place without any support but usually two trained volunteers are at hand if guidance is necessary. The game takes about an hour to solve (although the current leaders

at time of printing, Team Ellis, only took 31 minutes!) and the team with the best time over the summer will receive a small prize. It is great fun and very entertaining and can be adapted to different themes in the future. The present game is a murder mystery and, although finished for the time being, will hopefully be brought back during October Half Term for those who didn't have a chance to play during the summer holidays. Keep a look out for posters.

Kate spent a huge amount of time and effort in producing the Handbook and ensuring there are contingency plans in place if anything gets mislaid. She also has plans to produce a booklet so that other libraries can produce their own games. It is a terrific way of getting all age groups into the library and finding out about the huge range of activities on offer. This year's game has three well known literary detectives as characters and a murder mystery waiting to be solved.

Apart from a huge thank you to Kate for bringing this about we must also thank Juliet, Elaine and all the volunteers who enabled this exciting game to happen. ## **GARDEN TREE GIVEAWAY 2025**

The collection point and date for Sonning Common will be Abbeycrest Nursing Home on 28th November (pm) and 29th November (am).

Last year 52 households in the Sonning Common area took part in the GTG and we hope that many more will get involved again.





LAND'S END TO JOHN O'GROATS (LEJOG) BY LOCAL BUS













The idea for doing LEJOG by bus came from a book I read with my reading group, called 'Move along, please' by Mark Mason, in which he details his LEJOG journey by bus in 2012. I showed the book to David, suggesting that we could do the same - and he didn't say no!

The hardest thing was to find two weeks when neither of us had any commitments (yes, I know we're both retired, but that doesn't mean we sit around all day!). Once the dates were decided, David started working on our route, using online bus timetables (something which Mark Mason couldn't do in 2012). Once the route was sorted we were able to book our overnight accommodation, using Airbnb, Booking. com, Travelodge and Expedia. We wanted B&Bs which were within easy

walking distance of the bus stations and preferably not too expensive!

So on Friday 11 July, we boarded the number 25 bus from Sonning Common to Reading, took the train to Penzance, and then the number 1 bus to Land's End. We made sure we had our photo taken by the official signpost – but we had to wait until after 5 pm so that we didn't have to pay.

We thought we'd start off in style by booking our first night at the Land's End Hotel – but it wasn't to be. There was a fire at the hotel the week before, and they phoned to cancel our reservation. So we ended up in a historic hotel in the backstreets of Penzance – with no view. But it was clean and the bed was comfortable, which are important details.

The first few days in Cornwall seemed to go quite slowly, with us taking 3 or 4 buses each day, with an hour or more between each bus. These breaks gave us time to stretch our legs, have a quick look around the towns, and even have a cup of tea.

Then the buses became more frequent and we were able to do up to 5 buses a day. The buses were all on time, and the only hold up we had was when we came upon an accident which had just happened between Evesham and Worcester. We were in the front seats of the top deck, so we had a good view of the arrival of the police, the ambulances, the fire engines and then the air ambulance. The road was completely blocked, and we ended up having to walk about a mile back to Pershore to catch another bus.

The good thing about bus travel is that you can see over hedges (especially from a double decker) with magnificent views over the passing countryside but you can't ask a bus to stop while you take a photo! It was obvious as we travelled north that there had been more rain in the north than in the south this summer – the verges and lawns got progressively greener as we travelled beyond the Midlands.

In Mark Mason's book he mentions passing Barton-under-Needwood Christadelphian Hall. We didn't take the same route, but we got very excited in Crewe when the sign came up in the bus: 'Next stop Christadelphian Hall'. We were so busy trying to get a photo of the moving sign that we missed getting a photo of the hall!

We had a two-night stop in Keswick, taking a break from bus travel on the Sunday, and giving us a chance to Zoom in to the Sunday meeting. We did a bit of walking around Derwentwater – it was good not to have our suitcases with us all the time! We had several heavy showers though.

When we reached Scotland the bus travel was no longer free as English bus passes aren't accepted over the border (and vice versa). The towns are further apart and the bus routes are longer in Scotland, so we travelled further each day, but taking only two buses a day. The journey from Aberdeen to Thurso was a very long day: 4½ hours to Inverness, then 3½ hours to Thurso. (And we had to pay 30p to use the public toilet in Inverness bus station!)

We reached John O'Groats on Thursday 24 July, and had our 'official' photo taken without any suggestion of having to pay. We tried to decide which was the least tacky: Land's End or John O'Groats: both have overpriced gift shops and eateries, but there's more to entertain children at Land's End (not

necessarily a good thing).

Our trip done, we caught the bus back to Thurso, and then the train to Inverness. All was proceeding as planned until we approached Inverness and found that there was a problem with some points and the train could go no further ... so it took us back to Wick, from where there was a bus replacement service to Inverness, arriving 6 hours later than planned. Oh, the irony! The next day we took the train to Edinburgh, then King's Cross, and then Reading – and the number 25 bus home.

Route (overnight stops): Land's End, Roche, Camelford, Exeter, Bristol, Evesham, Stafford, Warrington, Keswick, Edinburgh,

Aberdeen, Thurso, John

Distance: 1.136 miles

O'Groats.

Buses: 40 (female drivers: 5)

We were well blessed with the weather.

'Move along, please' can be borrowed through the library service if anyone would like to read it. We also have a copy of 'Land's End to John O'Groats with a bus pass and a dog' by Eric Newton if anyone would like to borrow it (not available from the library)

As a fundraising idea for the primary school pool, we decided to run a 'Guess the miles travelled by bus competition, with people paying £1 for the privilege of guessing. (The distance, according to Google, is 817 miles on foot, 838 miles by car, and 968 miles by bicycle)

People seemed quite hesitant to enter, and we only raised £20 - but better than nothing. I suppose! The actual mileage was 1136 - and the winner, with a guess of 1125, was ... Juliet Legg!

Following this, on Saturday 20th September, the church hosted an afternoon tea party for those who had been involved with the project, as well as the church and local communities.

The completed improvements include a full replacement of the flat roof, with insulation; installation of solar panels and associated power bank; front extension to provide a

separate entrance into the church; interior decoration throughout and replacement flooring in the hall and coffee rooms; reordering of the church layout, including the removal of the existing font and reorientation of the central altar: a widened opening between the church and the hall with new soundproof bifold doors; energyefficient lighting and heating. To the front of the building, a replacement fence and gate was constructed, new signage and cladding added to the face of the building, and new signage and flower bed adjacent to the public path. There is still work to do to improve the grounds (after many months of building!) and plans to resurface the car park, with installation of an EV charging point.

The entire project was skillfully managed by the Parish churchwarden, Nick Room, who worked tirelessly to ensure that the work was carried out to the highest standard. And of course, the project would not have been possible at all without a generous legacy left by Mrs Jill Scraggs, faithful and long-standing member of the Christ the King Church community. A plaque to honour her has been placed on the wall in the new church entrance.

The Bishop of Dorchester has been invited to Christ the King to conduct a rededication service (date to be confirmed) to which all are warmly invited to attend.

Meanwhile, St John the Baptist is likely to be closing its doors in the middle of November so that vital work to the lighting, heating and decoration can be carried out. This will take some months, so Christmas services will be held at Christ the King. #### The Most Important Choice: Who Is Jesus?

Jesus Christ has sparked more debate than almost anyone in history. People call him a teacher, healer, prophet—but he claimed far more.

C.S. Lewis, author of The Chronicles of Narnia and a former atheist turned Christian, famously wrote in Mere Christianity:

"You must make your choice: either this man was, and is, the Son of God, or else a madman or something worse... But let us not come with any patronising nonsense about his being a great human teacher. He has not left that open to us. He did not intend to."

Lewis argued that Jesus's claims like forgiving sins and rising from the dead—don't allow for neutrality. If he was lying, he wasn't moral. If he was deluded, he wasn't wise. But if he was telling the truth, then he is Lord.

This trilemma—Liar, Lunatic, or Lord—forces a choice. Jesus didn't present himself as merely good; he claimed divinity. And if that's true, it changes everything.

So, the question remains: Who do you say Jesus is?

It's not just a theological puzzle—it's the most important decision you'll ever make. •
