Students from Key Stage 3 have been enjoying a variety of activities to extend their learning outside the classroom – trips to Hampton Court

Palace, the Jurassic Coastline and walking expeditions as part of the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme to name just a few. Year 9 have balanced this with taster sessions for their GCSE options subjects and a first experience of examstyle assessments in the Main Hall – the students have really engaged with this process, and they can be rightly proud of their achievements.

With just a handful of days left this term we excitedly welcome our upcoming Year 7 cohort to school for 2 days of induction. Students have a packed programme whereby they meet their tutor and tutor group, have their first lessons in Science, French and History as well as have an induction into their House and compete for the first of the House competitions of their undertook visits to a variety of providers High School careers. All these activities are designed to welcome students into our school community, build friendships and reduce any nerves ahead of students starting in September.


January and February tend to be quieter - full of hard work and often to the background of freezing days and rain. Sometimes we must bolster morale during these shorter, damper days.

WOW, WHAT A SUMMER IT TURNED OUT TO BE FOR **ECO SOCO!**



We launched Eco SoCo community cinema showcasing the inspirational film 'Wilding', kindly sponsored by Beville Estate Agents. A sell out event with a long waiting list for tickets! In addition, our guests were invited to take part in one of our exciting new projects: Patchwork for Pollinators; free British grown native wildflower seeds, alongside planting and care advice. The aim is to create a patchwork of native wildflowers across the village, in gardens, pots, or any receptacle that suits your fancy! Check out ecosoco.org.uk for



This event was swiftly followed by a packed and enthusiastic audience for our free evening with The Owl Conservation Project. The team introduced 3 owl breeds; a Tawny, a Little Owl and a Long Eared and explained that British owls are suffering badly from the impact of habitat loss, their numbers being significantly down compared with just a few years ago.

Ideas were shared as to how SC residents could help, such as planting a wide variety of pollinator friendly plants (these will support insect numbers which in turn will support the owl's



food chain), providing a large, shallow receptacle of water (Tawny owls love a bath) and reporting owl activity to the Owl Conservation Project, such as owls calling to each other at night. The Owl Conservation Project will in turn advise on how to track the owl's location. Once identified the team will check the owl's habitat and if necessary, provide support such as owl nesting boxes.


Interesting Owl facts:

Owl's face helps the owl 'hear'
Owl's eyes take up 70% of their skull!
Little Owls were often kept as pets

On June 1st Grace Lawrence and Nicki Walker, who work at local hairdressers Intensions in Sonning Common, completed a parachute jump from 10,00 feet to raise money for MacMillan Caring at Home – a small community charity that offers support for patients and families dealing with cancer treatment and post operative care. Both of these very plucky women completed the jump with real commitment and have raised over £4.000 for their amazing effort. Their original target of £1000 was totally smashed and it was a brilliant result. Both are local, with Grace born, raised and still living in Sonning Common and Nicki in Reading.

The day started incredibly early for them at 5.30am when they drove to Sarum, near Salisbury to meet up with their tandem partners Milas and Marianne. After a lot of nervous anticipation leading up to this point both found that the actual day brought a calm acceptance and a sense of huge excitement. After a safety briefing and donning body suits, they found they were the first to


jump that day and were soon sitting on benches either side of a small plane. It was extremely noisy in the plane but when they reached the correct height they were edged out of the door, flying with heads back and holding on to their harness. The aircraft noise blotted out the sound of their initial screams and when the parachutes opened it was a moment of sheer exhilaration. Both said it was a fantastic experience, and that it was very quiet and peaceful looking down at the small buildings and tiny figures below. They describe it as a hugely enjoyable experience and one they are both anxious to repeat again sometime.

The jump was over by 9am and after a very good landing both had family waiting for them to celebrate and congratulate them on their momentous achievement. It was certainly a moment to savour but both never forgot the reason for their flight. MacMillan Caring is a cause very close to their hearts as both are managing the shop in Sonning Common while their boss and friend Mari is recovering from treatment. Raising

awareness of the fantastic work being done by MacMillan is a recognition of the amazing work being done as well as applauding the fortitude and bravery of all patients and families receiving support.

A huge well done to you both. We applaud your very bold spirit and wish you both success in any other challenge you embark upon. Also, many thanks to all who have shown such great generosity.







Village Update

Annual Parish Meeting Success

Our Annual Parish Meeting brought together residents for an informative evening featuring presentations from nine local groups and initiatives. Speakers included Eco SoCo, Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty Extension, Inspired Villages, Village Gardeners, CPRE Oxfordshire, Cycleway Group, Millennium Green, Bees at the Allotments, and SoCo Spring Clean. Thank you to all the speakers and attendees who contributed to these important discussions about our community's future and environmental initiatives.

Village Hall Gets Green Upgrade

New planters have been installed at the village hall, featuring an innovative rainwater collection system that channels water directly from the hall's roof to keep the plants hydrated. This environmentally friendly addition not only beautifies our community space but also makes efficient use of natural rainfall.

Village Day 2025 - Our Best Yet!

Sunday 22nd June saw another fantastic Village Day in Memorial Park, and this year's event was bigger and better than ever! Building on the success of previous years, the community came together for what proved to be our most successful Village Day to date. Thank you to all the volunteers, participants, and attendees who made it such a memorable occasion.

Widmore Pond Water Level Recovery

With water levels in Widmore Pond continuing to drop, the Parish Council has secured a licence to pump water into the pond to support local wildlife and maintain this important village feature.

Our first pumping operation took place on Friday 27th June, when we successfully added 79,000 litres of water, raising the pond level by 7cm. We plan to continue regular pumping throughout July to help the pond recover.

We understand some residents may have concerns about using mains water due to chlorine content. The Parish Council has consulted with the Environment Agency, who have confirmed that maintaining water levels is more beneficial for wildlife than allowing the pond to dry out completely. The chlorine levels, when mixed with existing pond water, remain well within safe limits for wildlife. Additionally, chlorine naturally evaporates

over time, and our planned intervals between refills allow for this process to occur.

The Parish Council remains committed to preserving Widmore Pond as a vital part of our village environment and will continue monitoring water levels throughout the summer months.



NEW POWER PLANT FOR **SONNING COMMON?**

Well, I hope the headline has grabbed vour attention! Given the Parish Council intent to develop an Environmental Strategy I thought it was timely to report back on our recent experiences of going greener.

Our old family car, an Audi diesel, was starting to creak in potentially expensive places so it was time to consider alternatives. We were keen to go for greener personal transport and given most of our local journeys are under 40 miles we weighed a plug-in hybrid versus an all-electric car.

Range anxiety and lack of charging points are often highlighted in the press as reasons why people don't go all electric. However, after researching brands, battery ranges etc we settled on a Polestar 2 with long range battery option and single rear-wheel drive motor. This offers a real-world range of around 300 miles, seats five with a hatchback and decent sized boot space. It's built on a Volvo platform and feels solidly built.

More on the car later. Whilst looking at car choices we also looked into solar panels and a home car charger. Charging the car with "free" solar powered electricity felt like a sound, green approach but would it be costeffective? More research and advice necessary!

We explored advice and quotes from three solar panel installers. One national - Octopus, our energy supplier, took our details over the phone and

sent us a quote and cost-benefit analysis without even a site visit! The regional company we engaged with did come out to check the site but we were not impressed by their sales pitch which felt like a pressure sell to us. Finally, Jason from local firm Tethys, came to meet us and do a thorough site survey, including checking our roof space and joists etc.

Between the quotes there were small differences in the number and output of panels, proposed wiring and recommended battery options. However, whilst prices were broadly comparable Tethys were clearly the best value and we felt very comfortable working with them. We settled on 11 roof panels capable of generating 5.6kw of electricity and an 8kw battery to store surplus energy for evening use. As a ball park figure I'd suggest a typical family household would need to budget about £10k to have solar panels and battery installed.

At this point it is necessary to understand the sort of electricity supply so, since having the home charger tariffs available. At current prices Octopus charge us 28p per kw during the day but only 7p per kw, off-peak from 11.30pm to 5.30am. In addition, any surplus energy we generate during the day is bought from us for 15p a kw. By charging the car and running the washing machine etc overnight we benefit from the low, 7p rate whilst selling our day-time surplus at the higher 15p rate.

Last week, for instance, our panels generated about 100kw and we only used 30kw, including charging the car, so the 70kw excess was sold to the grid. The net result being no electricity

costs and a £10 surplus! Clearly, the system will not be as productive in Winter with less daylight. However, the modelling of power generated and savings suggested the system would pay for itself over an 8 year period. Given that the solar panels have a 25 year warranty we should see many years of truly free power in the long-

Enough of the technicalities! How has our experience been to date? Back to the car first. We are loving it! Very relaxed to drive with the electric motor providing braking as you lift your right foot off the accelerator we hardly need to touch the brakes. You soon get used to gradually lifting your foot off the accelerator to slow the car to a stop. There are no gears to deal with, just smooth, brisk acceleration and no need to use a hand-brake the car holds itself still when stopping on a hill.

Our longest trip to date has been to Bristol and back which is very comfortably within the 300 mile range installed, we've done all our charging from home at that cheap 7p off-peak rate. Even without our solar energy system that's about £6 for a full charge compared to about £50 for 300 miles worth of diesel! For longer trips, the car has Google built in, estimates battery use based on your driving and recommends charging points to stop at along the way. With a fast charging point the battery can be topped up 80% in about half an hour – time enough for a coffee and comfort break.

Back to the solar system. We had scaffolding up for a week but the installation and commissioning only took two days. The panels are neatly aligned on the roof, the battery is fixed to the wall down the side of the house and the extra fuse box and car charger sits next to the existing gas and electricity meter boxes.

As I'm no great fan of concrete roof tiles I don't believe the modern solar panels are aesthetically problematic on the roof – we don't really notice them. Whilst cabling is unobtrusive it has to be recognised that the various units do clutter up a stretch of front wall but that's where the electricity and gas meters were anyway.

The system comes with a smart app that lets you track energy use, solar panel output, energy transfers etc.

Lots of data for anyone taking an

interest in how their energy is flowing. An Octopus app links to the car charger and automatically set up charging times – I just plug the car in and it sorts the rest overnight.

So, what are the down sides? Well very little to report other than the slightly slow and cumbersome process for getting the house registered as an energy supplier. This involved SSE, who run the supply grid around here, giving you certification, which then needs to be processed by your actual energy provider, in our case Octopus. Even though the house supplies the grid from the installation day you don't get paid for the energy until the administrative process is complete! The whole process seems to take 6-8 weeks and you don't get

retrospective payment for the energy you've generated for the grid during this period.

I'm not sure we would have gone for an all-electric car if we didn't have driveway parking but even without an electric car I'm convinced the solar panel system would be a worthwhile green investment for many homes.

GIRL GUIDES IN SONNING COMMON HOW DID IT ALL START?



Back in 2019, I started volunteering with Girlguiding, not because I had a grand plan, but because my daughter's Rainbow unit had just closed. She loved being part of Girlguiding, and when the leader moved away for work, there was suddenly nothing local for girls her age. I saw how much she missed it, and I thought, "Why not give it a go myself?"

At the time, there were no units in Sonning Common for girls aged 5 to 7, so I decided to start one (1st Sonning Common Rainbows - we meet at the Scout and Guide Hut on Baskerville Road, Sonning Common). I already had two daughters in that age group, and although my day job is behind a computer, I figured I could bring something to the table. And honestly, I was looking for something more fulfilling to do with my Wednesday evenings.

Starting the Rainbow unit was one of the best decisions I've made. Every week, I get to help the girls take on fun challenges, try new things, and earn badges that they proudly sew onto their uniforms. It's not just about the badges, it's about what they represent: confidence, creativity, teamwork, and a sense of achievement. Watching the girls grow and come into their own has been incredibly rewarding.

After three years of running Rainbows, and with a little encouragement from my then 9-year-old daughter, I started thinking about the next step. There were girls finishing Brownies with nowhere to go next. So, in January 2023, I reopened the 1st Peppard Guides unit for girls aged 10 to 14. It had closed the year before due to low numbers and funding issues, but I

believed there was still a need and I was right.

We started with just three girls. It was a bit daunting at first, but by September, word had spread and our numbers began to grow. Now, we have 22 Guides, and the energy they bring each week is amazing.

Volunteering with Girlguiding has given me so much more than I expected. I've met brilliant people, learned new skills, and most importantly, I've seen firsthand how a supportive, fun environment can help girls thrive. It's not always easy, but it's always worth it.

Looking Ahead

Right now, I'm working towards completing the Going Away With Scheme, a residential licence that allows Girlguiding leaders to take girls on overnight trips, from indoor holidays to full-on camps. A big milestone was leading our first unit camp at the Scout Adventures Youlbury in Oxford which was a fantastic experience for both the girls and the leaders.

And there's more on the horizon. I'm incredibly excited (and a little nervous!) to have been selected as one of four leaders taking a group of 12 Guides and Rangers from Oxfordshire to Sangam, one of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts' World Centres, located in Pune, India. It's a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity where girls from

around the world come together to learn, share, and give back to the local community.

As I get ready for this exciting journey, I'm also busy fundraising to help cover travel costs and make sure these trips can actually happen. It's going to be such a meaningful experience for the girls and for us as leaders.

If you've ever thought about getting involved, whether as a volunteer or by signing up your daughter, I'd say go for it. You never know the difference you might make.



A minimum of 3 working days (excluding weekends and Bank Holidays and the Christmas period) is needed to process a patient's request for medication. Our reception and administrative staff always follow this policy, and they are not authorised to make any exceptions.

Urgent medication may be issued on an urgent same-day basis: These are medications that the patient could endure harm within 2 working days by missing the doses. This includes:

- Anticoagulants such as apixaban
- Anti-seizure medications for epilepsy
- Anti-psychotic medication such as aripiprazole
- Medications for Schizophrenia/ Bipolar/Psychosis such as lithium and quetiapine
- Parkinson's medications such as cocareldopa
- Long term steroids taken every day e.g. hydrocortisone
- DMARDs Disease-modifying antirheumatic drugs e.g. methotrexate.
- Anti-rejection tablets such as tacrolimus
- Certain heart medications
- Palliative care medications
- Adrenaline
- Diabetic medication for type 1 diabetes
- Specialised baby milk

THE GP IS CLOSED BUT YOU NEED URGENT MEDICATION...

If you run out of medicine outside of your GP practice's normal opening hours and need some urgently, there are a few ways to get an emergency supply quickly, even if you're away from home.

Visit a pharmacy

Under the Urgent Provision of Repeat Medication Service, Community Pharmacists may be able to supply you with a further cycle of a previously repeated medicine, without having to get a prescription from your GP. It's a good idea to take an old prescription or the medicine's packaging with you, if you have it.

You'll be interviewed by the pharmacist to find out:

- if you need the medicine immediately
- who previously prescribed the medicine (to make sure they're a trusted source)
- what dose of the medicine would be appropriate for you to take

The pharmacist will need to know the answers to all these questions before they can supply a prescription-only medicine without a prescription in an EMERGENCY

Controlled drugs and antibiotics are not provided through this service, you will need to ring 111 for these.

Use the NHS pharmacy service search to find other nearby pharmacies and their

opening hours - some are open even on public holidays.

NHS 111 service

Patients can now access 111 online (www.111.nhs.uk/emergency-prescription) to request a limited emergency supply of a medicine you've completely run out of. This must be a medicine you are prescribed regularly, through a repeat prescription.

If you'd like to speak to someone first, call NHS 111 free of charge by dialling 111 on your mobile or landline. The person you speak to will be able to look up an out-of-hours pharmacy or another NHS service in your area.
